Voting Timeline

30 days before Election Day: voting registration ends

29 days before Election Day: absentee voting starts, early voting starts

7 days before Election Day: last day to request absentee voting

6 days before Election Day: Unforeseeable Hospitalization absentee voting starts

2 days before Election Day: early voting ends at 5 PM the Sunday before Election Day

> 1 day before Election Day: absentee ballots must be postmarked

Election Day: standard in-person voting starts, Unforeseeable Hospitalization absentee voting ends at 3 PM

Voting Rights

You have the right to vote.

If you are an American citizen who is 18 or older, without a felony, and who has lived in Ohio for 30 days or more, you have the right to vote. Those under guardianship or those institutionalized also still have the right to vote. The Americans with Disabilities Act and Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act of 1984 require the government to make sure voting locations are accessible. The Voting Rights Act of 1965 protects voters from having to pass any tests to vote and makes sure that you can have assistance to vote if you need it. Finally, the National Voter Registration Act of 1993 makes sure there are accessible voting machines at polling locations.

Ways of Voting

Vote in Person

All polling locations are required to have accessible voting equipment available, setup, and ready for voters.

Curbside Voting

In Ohio, you can vote from your vehicle at polling locations. Some sites have a doorbell for curbside voting, so it's helpful to have someone with you to alert staff. Curbside voting is also available during early voting, but be sure to contact the location in advance.

Absentee Voting

Mail your ballot after signing up for an absentee ballot before the election. Ensure your ballot is mailed and postmarked by the deadline, which is the day before the election. Check the timeline to avoid missing any deadlines. Accessible ballots can be requested for blind voters.

Special Absentee Ballot

If you or your child is hospitalized by an accident or medical emergency. This is available from the sixth day before the election until 3 PM on Election Day itself. Make sure to find the specific form online to get one of these ballots.

What you'll need to vote:

At least a month before the election, you need to make sure that you're registered to vote.

On the back of this pamphlet, there's a link you can follow to make sure you're registered.

When you go to your polling location to vote, you need to have a form of identification (ID) on you.

This can be one of the following: Ohio driver's license, State of Ohio ID card (or Interim ID paper form from the BMV), a US passport or passport card, US military ID card, Ohio National Guard ID card, or US Department of Veterans Affairs ID card.
