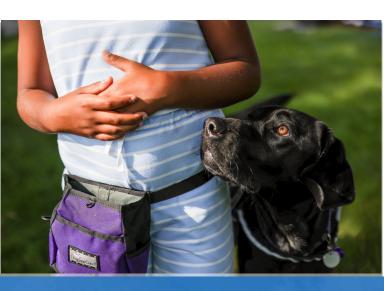

Service dogs also provide balance support while walking, retrieve phones, and assist with tugging off clothing, making daily activities more manageable for their handlers.
